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

SUPPORTING YOUR SQUID POLE ANTENNA—Bob VK3EL

So you've bought your new 6 Meter "Squid-Pole" from "WANSARC" and now you'd like to get it up and running with a dipole or perhaps a wire antenna experiment of your own design? But before you get round to using it you might be wondering how to get the pole to stay Vertical while you're operating in the field?

There are no doubt countless ways to do it, and you may have already thought of your own method, but the two gadgets shown above which are both available commercially from the large DIY hardware outlets, could be your quick and easy way of setting up your portable antenna system if you want to spend some money and boost our economy at the same time? Both the stands, shown below, were originally marketed to support the popular "Market Umbrellas". The **stand on the left** is designed to screw into sand or soil with its large worm thread, but <u>NOT</u> and I repeat <u>NOT</u> to screw into land fill made of crushed rock or brick as I found out after 10 frustrating minutes trying to get the thread to start! (These retailed for about \$22 a few months ago.)



The stand on the right just sits on a reasonably flat surface and I've used some metal thread screws and wing nuts to attach a series of wire radials around the edge of the steel base plate and attached a suitably sized piece of PVC tubing using a couple of large worm-drive clamps to support the Squid-Pole. These stands are very expensive at \$70 and up, and come in both square & circular base designs. I was lucky and found my square version at one of the charity shops at \$10

If you wanted to engineer the flat type yourself, you would need a square piece of flat steel plate approx: 41cm square and 5mm.thick and a 40cm length of galvanized pipe of a suitable diameter welded in the centre of the plate (the pipe diameter of the commercially built one is approx.6cms.O.D) then attach a 40cm.length of PVC pipe to accommodate your "Squid-Pole", with worm-drive clamps. You will probably need to "shim" the PVC pipe to keep your squid-pole firmly upright .(I used scrap PVC tubing cut to size for "shim" packing)

A Few Hints

Both designs will comfortably support the longer 9 meter squid pole without guying, assuming you don't use wire which is too heavy. However I have found dropping the very thin top section of the "squid -pole" inside the second uppermost section will tend to stop excessive bending of the pole and possible future breakage.

I've also found the plastic covered steel clothesline wire is very good for radial wires as it doesn't tangle easily, however it is also quite dear to buy new. Keep an eye open for a cheap bulk buy source?

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"Sky-Hooks" are NOT available at DIY stores! Cheers, Bob VK3EL.

HELP WANTED—Victor VK3DKM

I have an Alinco DJ-596 VHF/UHF dual band HT which has been locked/programmed to only operate at 10 UHF channels (from 419-428MHz).

The most simple solution is to find another DJ-596 that is working properly and clone the setting across via the "clone-cable" to my radio. The cable is simply a straight through cable with 3.5mm stereo plugs at both ends and I do have such a cable in my junk box. May be one of the club member own or have access to a DJ-596 and I can bring my unit to the next club meeting to do the cloning.

Alternative, Alinco (and third parties) sell a software called "SW-596" and with a "programming cable" either the ERW-4C/OPC-478 (serial) or ERW-7 (usb) both available on ebay and a PC, one can reprogramme the radio at will. So if any member happen to own (or gain access to) the software and the programming cables they may re-programme my radio back to it's full glory.

Apparently, the same "programming cable" and software do work with the following models; DJ-196T, DJ-296T, DJ-496T, DJ-C6T, DJ-C7T, DJ-V5T, DJ-V17T, DJ-V27T, DJ-V47T, DJ-596T, DJ-X3T, DJ-X7T, DJ-X2000T.

So owner of above mentioned units and is in procession of the software may also help!
